The Texas Department of Transportation is proposing improvements to I-30 from Bass Pro Road in Dallas County to west of FM 2642 in Dallas and Rockwall counties. The project cost is about \$700 million and the construction will be phased to begin in 2021 and 2023.

Two public meetings, with no formal presentations, will be held to answer questions.

# Two East Dallas schools benefit from \$1 million in Catholic Foundation grants



t's been a good season for St. Bernard of Clairvaux Catholic School and St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School in East Dallas. During its annual spring grant, the schools were two of 26 to share in \$1 million in funds from <a href="The Catholic Foundation">The Catholic Foundation</a>.

Twice per year, the religious nonprofit helps parochial schools with everything from new technology labs to infrastructure improvements. To date, the organization has given away \$126 million in its 55 years, including \$18.3 million in 2016 alone.
