CATHOLIC FOUNDATION CONTINUES SPONSORSHIP OF DALLAS DIOCESE TELEVISED MASS THROUGHOUT 2022

When shelter-in-place guidelines closed area churches in March of 2020, Bishop Burns recognized a need for the liturgy to continue reaching the public by way of a weekly televised Mass in Spanish and English.

The Catholic Foundation agreed to partner with the Catholic Diocese of Dallas as the financial broadcast sponsor of televised Sunday Masses on local television, and the first televised Mass aired on Palm Sunday 2020.

The impact of the televised Masses, based upon calls, letters and emails received, has been greater than ever anticipated, and the Foundation will continue as the broadcast sponsor of the Diocese of Dallas Masses throughout 2022.

“A year and a half ago, we felt it was very important that we all pray in place when we were asked to shelter in place,” says Matt Kramer, President and CEO of The Catholic Foundation.

It takes \$10,000 to establish a Donor Advised Fund at The Catholic Foundation and you and/or the recipient of this gift can make additional tax-deductible gifts at any time.

Once the fund is established the recipient may have the right to recommend distributions from the fund to the charities they want to support.

They can make a recommendation at any time now or several days and/or months from now. Recommendations may be made to qualified charities across the United States and they can be Catholic or non-Catholic charitable organizations (i.e. the symphony, your favorite museum, etc.).

A Donor Advised Fund at The Catholic Foundation offers optimal flexibility for charitable giving, significant tax advantages, investment

“Today, as more people return to their own churches, we recognize there are still thousands of shut-ins who physically can’t worship in person,” says Kramer. “We want to ensure that those unable to attend their nearby parish for health and safety reasons have access to weekly Mass in the most convenient and comfortable format and that’s television.”

The bulk of the sponsorship involves the network broadcast feed to air the Spanish Mass on Univision, Ch. 23, at 10 a.m. and English Mass on KDFI-TV, channel 7 or 27 depending upon video service provider, at 11 a.m. and noon. It’s anticipated that in early 2022 the English Mass will only air at 11 a.m., and advance notices will be provided to viewers on-air.

While the first televised Mass took place at the Cathedral Guadalupe in downtown Dallas, subsequent Masses took place at many of the 77 parishes throughout the Dallas Diocese. The Masses were celebrated by different priests which exposed people to various homilists.

HEARTWARMING GRATITUDE FROM VIEWERS

As more people learned about The Catholic Foundation’s sponsorship of the Masses, unsolicited donations earmarked for the Masses began arriving.

“We’re grateful for the generosity of those who

have contributed to the televised Masses to ensure they would continue,” says Kramer.

Many viewers have shared intimate stories of how the fear of contracting Covid or exposing existing medical conditions unrelated to the pandemic prevented them from attending church in person. Others said the televised Masses motivated their families to pray more as a unit.

An inmate from an out-of-state prison recently made a financial donation so that he could continue to enjoy the livestream of the televised Mass while he was incarcerated.

Some of the most heart-warming stories have come from the homebound. One such person wrote, “During the Covid 19 crisis, my husband and I have been isolated and unable to go to church or receive the Eucharist. We feel so blessed to have The Catholic Foundation help televise the Masses on Sunday.

“It’s a wonderful feeling to partake in the rituals of our beliefs and celebrate the sacred mysteries by singing and reciting parts of the Mass.

We understand that it’s a big undertaking and a huge expense. But we hope that televised Masses continue for many years to come.”

Another individual expressed gratitude, writing “The televised Mass has been a real Godsend. We have enjoyed every telecast and feel spiritually fulfilled every Sunday.”

REACHING SHUT-INS AND HOMEBOUND

The common theme in most of the messages received was that of thanksgiving for bringing God to them through challenging times via Mass on TV.

The Catholic Foundation is working in partnership with the Diocese of Dallas to identify and reach shut-in and homebound viewers, and those who live in senior citizen facilities in the 31 county viewership zone of the televised Masses.

The outreach will seek to help put those people directly, or via their professional or personal caregivers, in touch with their nearest parish to obtain pastoral ministries in the form of connecting with clergy and to receive the Blessed Sacrament.

Jina said she hopes people will find happiness in seeing her painting and invites people to visit The Catholic Foundation Plaza and be happy.

She has loved drawing, painting, and performing music from a young age. Growing up in Korea, Jina majored in piano at Yonsei University and participated in the Student Fine Art Association.

She and her family emigrated to the United States in 1978 for new opportunities.

They didn't speak English, and struggled with finances, so practicality was essential.

Jina studied to become a CPA. After her retirement, she decided it was time to take the plunge and become a full-time artist. She enrolled in North Lake College to study art with a long-term goal of earning a master's degree in fine arts. One of her professors gave the class a calendar of art competitions, in which she learned about The Catholic Foundation Art on the Plaza competition.

In the initial stages of painting "Be Happy," Jina considered the setting and its significance. She decided to create a piece that would enliven the Plaza since it is surrounded by tall buildings in an urban environment. 🌈

\$1.3 Million in Fall Grants to Fund Wide Range of Needs For Local Churches, Schools and Nonprofits

A dozen local schools, churches and community organizations were awarded \$1.3 million during The Catholic Foundation's fall grant ceremony at St. Jude Center – Forest Lane, a past grant recipient.

Funded by the Foundation's unrestricted Philanthropy Fund as well as funds established by individuals and families to carry out their charitable goals, the grants will support various projects including HVAC replacements, facility renovations, the purchase of a van, church organ repair and technology upgrades for school classrooms.

"Thanks to the generosity of our donors, these grants allow The Catholic Foundation to help fund projects that will support deserving organizations in our community," said Matt Kramer, President and CEO of The Catholic Foundation. "With the help of our board of trustees and our donors, The Catholic Foundation is able to fulfill its mission of promoting compassionate charitable giving

and stewardship that serves donors and the needs of our community."

Twice per year, The Catholic Foundation distributes community grants to local Catholic churches and schools and nonprofit organizations. Grant requests are reviewed by the Board of Trustees' Distribution Committee, followed by documented site visits by Trustees through which the recipients and funding amounts are determined.

Over time, The Catholic Foundation has provided more than \$239 million in grants to religious, charitable and educational organizations.

Karla J. Bellinger, M.A., DMIN, has been named founding Executive Director of the Institute for Homiletics at the University of Dallas with the goal of improving preaching in the Catholic Church.

The Institute is a collaboration of The Catholic Foundation and the University of Dallas.

In her new role, Bellinger will work to strengthen the preaching of Catholic priests, deacons, and seminarians so that they flourish in their ministry of the Word. Beginning with the Diocese of Dallas and then moving outward to the broader Church, the Institute will build a vision of preaching whose purpose is to bring the people of God into an encounter with the living God.

“I am so pleased that we are establishing the Institute for Homiletics within the Dallas Diocese and grateful to the donors who contributed to the funds that make this initiative possible. The tremendous knowledge and wisdom Karla has accrued in knowing how

homiletics and evangelization are united provides the Institute with a proven leader,” says Bishop Edward Burns. “Through her work, with God’s grace, Karla will help our priests and deacons here in the Diocese of Dallas and beyond to enhance their preaching in ways that will positively transform lives and create deep-rooted encounters with Christ.”

Bellinger says “listeners hunger for inspiration,” and adds that “people in the pews want to hear a message that gives them life. Clergy thirst for their congregation to encounter Jesus Christ and want to inspire them and see the fruit of a Christian life.”

Funding that supports the new Institute comes from The Bishop Tschoepe Institute of Homiletics and Communications Fund of The Catholic Foundation that was

established in 1985 along with The Homiletics Fund of The Catholic Foundation established by Jim Moroney in 2019 for the purpose of creating a permanent endowment which supports the annual operations of the Institute.

Presently, including the Bishop Tschoepe Fund, more than \$8 million of the \$10 million goal has been raised. Fundraising is ongoing, and the \$10 million endowment will provide a permanent source of funding for the annual operations of the Institute. Donors may make contributions to the Funds at any time.
